## The culture and preparation of tea

In Ceylon cultivation follows an entirely different line from that just described. The standard operation is envelope forking whereby an 18-in. fork is driven about 12in. into the ground and the soil loosened. If organic matter in the way of light prunings is available, this is pushed into the envelope formed by levering the fork forward. This forking leaves the area in a series of little parallel ridges which hold the water and reduce erosion. Apart from this, the soil in Ceylon is kept clean weeded. Often weeds destroyed although sometimes they are collected, rotted down and replaced on the soil. Ceylon procedure, like that in North-East India, is based on experiment and experience.
